



David's Dialogue

Dear members and friends of St. Matthew's

So, Peter said to them, "I begin to see how true it is that God shows no partiality [...]. This is the message God has sent to the people of Israel, the Good News of peace proclaimed through Jesus Christ, who is saviour of all. Acts: 10:34

It has been more than two years now since St. Matthew's became an Affirming Ministry. What is Affirming Ministry? An Affirming Ministry is a church or other faith community, like a camp or an outreach organization, that is explicitly and publicly welcoming of people of different gender identities and sexual orientations. We don't just say it. We do it. Our flags in the sanctuary and in the entrance have been noticed and have made an important difference to many who have entered the church. And the work continues. Every year, we have collaborated with Richmond Hill United in this work, including marching in the York Region Pride Parade.

The Bible is full of stories of change. When Peter and other early Christians realized that non-Jews could be meant to receive the Gospel they were shocked. Our scripture says, "**The Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were surprised that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out on the gentiles also[.]**" They finally understand, that anyone regardless of faith or ethnic background could receive the Holy Spirit and recognize Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of God, the risen saviour.

This is what Peter says in response: "**I begin to see... any person of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to God.**" For the earliest followers of Jesus, this meant change but not capitulation of their most deeply held beliefs, as some feared. It meant changing their interpretation of Scripture but not abandoning it. It meant changing their sense of identity as Jews but not discarding it. It meant changing their religious priorities and practices but keeping their commitment to Jewish things like regular worship, prayer, generosity and care for others. Suddenly they saw their community of faith differently.

Peter is just "beginning" to understand the fullness of the gospel. So are we. If

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we want to continue to grow in our understanding and faith we will have to open our ears and listen. Prayer is most often thought of as a conversation with God, where we speak and then listen. If we are good at prayer, we may find it is mostly about listening.

Perhaps someone or something is asking to be understood, forgiven. Perhaps God is speaking to us, asking us to change a little, to make more room for others. Perhaps we are afraid and God is telling us everything will be okay. Perhaps the voice we hear is asking us to put our trust in our loving Creator in a way we have resisted up until now. Lets open our ears and listen!

Those people who really started to change the thinking of the United Church in the 1980s, saying that people of different sexual orientations belonged in church just as they are, pointed to this story as an example of the kind of change that was needed. The church often gets stuck in an old ways of thinking. It is my prayer that, like Peter, we will have the courage to open our hearts to the new directions of the Spirit, to really think about the kinds of changes she may be asking us to make.

UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

At the end of the walk the participants are provided a light warm snack which, in the past, has been donated by local businesses. This year it was suggested that the local faith communities might be willing to support OoTC by providing this snack. There will be approximately 400 people and will take place at Lauremont School at 500 Elgin Mills Road East. Richmond Hill UC will look after organizing this event but needs volunteers to assist with preparation and serving on walk day.
