David's Dialogue

Dear members and friends of St. Matthew's:

John 10: My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand.

Bob was a member of the Mandaumin United Church that I served near Sarnia in the early 2000s. Bob was a farmer. Most of my congregants were farmers. But there was something special about Bob's farm: Bob had sheep. Easter had just passed and Bob was coming to church looking a little more excited than usual. He was very keen to tell me that the mama sheep were giving birth. He wondered if I had the time to come for a visit. I did indeed. But when I showed up I discovered the sheep didn't want to see me. When they heard my voice they scampered off to the far side of the pen. Bob explained that they always did that with strangers. As Bob and I talked there at the fence, however, I noticed how they began to relax. Especially when Bob talked. His voice would draw them in. It seemed to put them at ease.

The experience gave me an important insight into the Bible passage this morning, and indeed into many passages and stories from the Bible: "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me." That part about the voice is important. Sheep notice the voice. They recognize the voice. Somehow, it is at least as important or maybe even more important than recognizing the shepherd by sight.

There is an intimacy to the voice. Sounds can fill us with fear, make our blood run cold or curdle. A scream or shout for help, for example, especially from someone we know. Sounds can also fill us with a sense of comfort, safety, and warmth, like the sound of a loved one stepping in the front door or calling out in greeting.

It is a remarkable and curious fact that so many of the prophets in

the Bible were shepherds. Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Rachel and all their sons and daughters were shepherds. Moses heard God's voice while tending his flocks. David was called from shepherding the sheep to be king of Israel. It must have been a very special experience to have a group of animals so completely dependent on you to lead them to the green pastures and quiet waters, reliant upon you for safety in the most extreme dangers, and your mercy in life and death. As a shepherd, a person would have responsibility for a whole range of needs and would develop a sense of trust with the sheep that one kept. That experience must have taught a lot of good lessons about how to lead people and also about the nature of God's love for us all.

The shepherd's voice plays an important role in their ability to communicate with the sheep. The same is true of our relationship with God. Voice counts for something. The great call to faith in the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Bible, begins this way: "Hear, Oh Israel, YHWH your God is one!" The Good News of the gospel is something that is first heard, rather than seen or touched or tasted. It travels in through our ears then into our bodies to touch our innermost heart. The ear is the channel to the soul.

This month pay attention to the voices around you, those of other people and of the non-human creatures around you. How does their sound affect you? When do they make you feel safe? When do they put you on alert? When to do they comfort? When do they instruct? God continues to speak to us. It is important to recognize God's voice.

We have often been told about the "Good News" during our time at church. Perhaps some of us may lose focus on what that means. The Good News in the Bible, often referred to as the "gospel," centres around the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It's the announcement that God has provided a way for humanity to be reconciled with him through Jesus's sacrifice. Essentially, it's the promise of salvation and forgiveness of sins, offering hope and a restored relationship with God.

In the Christian faith, the terms "Good News" and "Gospel" are often used interchangeably. "The good news" (or "gospel" = "good spiel") is a literal translation of the Greek word euangelion.

Upcoming Special Services and Activities



Recent Work On Our Building

- ♦ Bill arranged and supervised the digging out and replacement of a section of the main sewer pipe leading from the women's washroom. The pipe was snaked with a camera which located the break near the "T joint". Access to the break was needed in the hall's large closet at the south end. The repair company did a great job. Twelve tiles were removed to break up the floor to get to the pipe and when the repair was done, that section of the floor was cemented in making a smooth surface. The work is now complete so flush away without fear! The price? Some \$8,000.
- ♦ We are still awaiting estimates for our parking lot repairs. We need to dig out the lot on the east side of the building, refill the sunken areas, replace the paving, then paint the parking space lines. We may need a few signs added as well. Total job could be \$70,000 or more.
- ♦ Still to be done: Repair the ceiling near the front door. Supplies were purchased; Bill now needs helpers to do the job. The water damage in the ceiling between the kitchen and Room 101 require the replacement of some ceiling tiles. Can you help?
